In October Central Coast bush band **Fair Dinkum** played at the Kincumber (Community) School of Arts Hall. The very special occasion was an art show and auction to mark the Centenary of the opening of the Hall. The Hall was the community hub of the small village, especially during WW1 but also until the 1950's and 60's. It obviously was used for weddings and wakes, dances and movies and church services in earlier times by both the Catholics and Anglicans when their own buildings were needing repair. The dance floor had been replaced in recent months, not just by tradies... so to speak... but by CRAFTSMAN. It has been top nailed, puttied and sanded !

The band played tunes from the World War 1 era much to the delight of the very appreciative crowd. Some of the sheet music was brought from NZ in 1928 by Ian's piano playing dad and included "Till we meet again" and "Let the rest of the world go by". The band included other popular WW1 "hits" like "Australia Will Be There."

Ian is joined in the band by a group of our younger musicians (aged from 16 to 24.) Our musical traditions are in good hands!

Pennant Hills Dance Activities at Pennant Hills Community Centre: (lower, air-conditioned hall)

On 13th October thirteen dancers danced Victoria Waltz Quadrille, Carol of the Birds, Grimstock, At Skaters' Pond, Golden Wattle Waltz Quadrille and Monymusk.

On 20th October, 17 dancers were present to start learning the dances for the Central Coast November dance. Dances included Five Spot Rag, Dinky One Step, Mississippi Dip, New Fitzroy Quadrille (Fig 1), Happy Returns and Galopede Country Dance.

Monday 27th October was another workshop for the Central Coast November dance. Twenty four dancers learned Yearning Saunter, Circular Rag, Levi Jacksons, Veleta Progressive and Mississippi Dip.

On Monday 3rd November the workshop danced to live music provided by the JH Dance Band, who will be playing at the Central Coast November dance. Nineteen dancers enjoyed Dinky One Step, Happy Returns, Chicago Swing, Circular Rag, New Fitzroy Quadrille Fig 1, Tango Schottische, Castle Schottische, Yearning Saunter and Levi Jacksons Rag. Our thanks to the JH Dance Band!

On Monday 10th November we had a mixed dance workshop, trying out some new dances as well as some old favourites. Twenty dancers enjoyed Skaters' Pond, Golden Wattle Waltz Quadrille, Cataract, Dust Devils, Waratah Way, Guiding Light and Turning Gold against the Grey.

On Monday 17th November we started to practice some dances for the dance workshop Christmas Party planned for 8th December. Twenty dancers enjoyed St Bernards Waltz, Whitehorse Waltz, Galloping Carousel, Cambewarra Waltz, Circassian Circle and the Barn Dance (Prog and Non-Prog).

On Monday 24th November, Nineteen dancers danced St Bernards Waltz, Borrowdale Exchange, Cascades, At Skaters' Pond, Galloping Carousel and Cambawarra Waltz. Thanks to Keith Wood for teaching his BMC award-winning dance, Harbour Bridge Quadrille.

That's Not How I Heard It ...

CD of Australian Poetry by Jason Roweth

Jason and Chloe Roweth need no introduction to the Australian folk community and beyond. Their vocal and instrumental abilities, interpretations and achievements have contributed much to the Australian heritage. The delight and great satisfaction to us older fogies in knowing that such a relatively young couple have committed themselves to adopting, spreading and continuing the tradition that people like John Meredith and others fought for.

This album is different to all their other productions as this time Jason is the solo vocalist (albeit the spoken word), though Chloe's mandolin and, no doubt, her less-obvious contributions have added to the success of this CD. Yes, there are instrumental excerpts on this album of poetry; beautiful old tunes known to most of us.

The poetry titles are well known to me and no doubt to most others interested in traditional bush poetry. Jason recites four of the Banjo's: *Shearing at Castlereagh, Been There Before, How Gilbert Died* and *Clancy of the Overflow*. Jason performs Ted Harrington's humorous *The Swagless Swaggie*, along with Lawson's more serious, but excellent time-tested poems, *The Green-Hand Rouseabout, The Shearers* and *On the Night Train* very ably.

Jack Moses's *When the Police Force Couldn't Spell* is guaranteed to get a laugh for listeners of Jason's interpretation.

Presentations of his mate's work, the late John Dengate, are very well executed. These are: *The Lanes of Woolloomooloo*, and *Australian Made*. I consider the former to be the best, or as good as the best, Australian war poem ever. I am showing my bias, but have to say that the CD is worth getting for these two poems of John's. (And to think that all those other well-recited poems come with them!)

Denis Kevans' hilarious *When the Monkeys Rode the Greyhounds* and his emotive *White Man, Have You Any Sacred Sites*? are thoughtful inclusions to this album.

Many years ago Duke Tritton would say to members of the Bush Music Club, that when you sang, it should be with venom. I am sure the Duke would have been more than satisfied with Jason's interpretation of Duke's own, powerful poem, The Sandy Hollow Line.

I am very pleased that Jason and Chloe have added the spoken word to their long list of achievements. I have heard Jason reciting on stage at a couple of venues and am now very pleased to have his recitations on CD. He is a fine reciter who recites with feeling, good diction and a strong Australian voice.

The selected passages of tunes add to the production, making toe-tapping distinctions between poems. Of course, I highly recommend that people with interest in the Australian spoken word, or those that feel it time they were introduced to quality bush poetry recitations - traditional and a couple of more recent ones – would be more than happy with this CD in their collection.

Bush Traditions Gathering – first timer's report

How lucky was I to be invited to do a lagerphone making workshop at the Bush Traditions 9th Goulburn Gathering 2014 by Dave Johnson. This was after performing with the Concert Party at the 60th Anniversary Bush Music Club's Dinner, Ermington, in my first year of being a BMC member. Co-incidentally my 2014 / 9th boutique lagerphone made since January 2012 was the 60th Anniversary BMC creation, which I made and presented to the club during 2014. This now resides in Hut 44 and is signed monthly by Duke's Place performers.

Having never been away with the BMC to a venue, and not knowing anything about the Gathering at the Brewery over the October long weekend, I had to find what facilities existed. The Mews, town motels, camping, Tiger snakes, possibility of venue flooding, the Lilac Festival, Saturday night dance in town and the Gathering's program seemed to be major items of importance. Where would the workshops be; outdoors or inside; would there be 240 volt power and light; what tools and equipment would I need to bring in my small car; where would I eat and what clothing as always??? I was advised to contact Father Michael and a Mews bed was available and luckily / co-incidentally room 9 was mine!

I had reckoned on making three remaining broom-stick lagerphone 'legs' each with 72 doubled-up beer bottle tops (144), arranged in colour coordinated sequences to match 3 previously made 'heads', thinking that I'd be work-shopping both Saturday & Sunday. When I saw the emailed venue/program before leaving home and knowing at that stage that only an hour had been allocated, I freaked-out! This later shrivelled to 20 or 30 minutes on the day, which only allowed 18 galvanized clouts, 36 beer bottle tops, a hand-grip foam tube and the 'billy-can' 'head' to be nailed in and screwed on, to complete 1 of 3 lagerphones. Luckily it had been previously suggested that I partly prepare the items / workings beforehand, which I'm glad that I did.

Sure enough at 9am. (how about that ; 4 times 9 = 36) there was Francis Greenway's architecture / Brewery partially hidden by a 1-2 metre high flood levee bank, set on the pastoral land and within the gravel road 'moat'. The campers were straight ahead through the paddock gate amongst the cow-pats and two porta-loos. No sign of 'Kenny' though or the Tiger snakes, but what a beaut warm and sunny blue-sky Saturday morning!

I was directed to the Mill on the northern side of the brewery where I got set-up before the 10am. Monty's Tunes session began. At 11am the Mill's interior lighting was only adequate, being that coming through windows behind me. With Bob Foggin's and others assistance, the 36 beer tops were nailed; the foam hand-grip sleeve and the 'billy-can head-piece were attached before BMC's President Sharyn called time is-up. The rest of the hour's bush instrument making workshop segment was shared between Bob Bolton and Ray Gurney. Tools, bush instruments & equipment were re-loaded into my car, and only the necessary ones were retrieved when needed, my gear was in and out of my car many times over several days!

It was difficult deciding which of the 3 venues to attend. Some were extremely popular. There was food at the Camp Ground with celebrity chef Graeme Morrison cooking dinner for about 35 on the Saturday night. Over 25 musicians played on-stage at St Saviour's Hall, Goulburn for enthusiastic dancers, with the dances called by Don Richmond. Many of the musicians came from the Gathering with a sprinkling of locals and a young lady from USA. Those who remained at the Brewery were entertained by an Evening Blackboard Concert. A night for all to remember.

I'm sure I heard strains of a concertina emerging from the Malting's windows 'bout 8.30 Sunday in the 'still' of the morning as I waltzed from the dunny to breakfast! Apart from that you could've heard a pin drop, bar I didn't have my hearing aids in. It seemed that camping folks enjoyed the extra walk to the racecourse southern extremity, so's not to use the limited amenities on-site, which was sometimes painful. Several Saplings attended a long session with many young-at-heart oldies and instruments to learn from. Another busy day ensued, with some sessions relocated, which tested those who had drunk too much the night before. It seemed that most people attended The Gathering Dinner and Singabout; Saplings gave wonderful performances, Thomas with the Barcoo-dog he'd played, donated by myself. A late night / early morning finish ensued well after the young'uns had gone. An informal session continued on into Monday morning past 3am as well.

The Monday instrument try-out and the other 3 venue sessions took up to lunch time, hence I sadly departed for my drive home, but not before finding another interesting long-distance travelling lady to discuss the traps of out-back motoring with. I found myself in similar situations of commonality during the perfect weekend experienced, and would recommend it for the learning curve which it provided myself.


