Book Review

Araluen: a history through photographs c 1840-2000, Braidwood and District Historical Society Inc, 2014, \$25.00

This book gives a portrait of what it was like growing up, living and working in the Araluen area and surrounding districts. The early settlers had to put up with a lot of hardship with little of the pleasures experienced by the larger regional areas or cities. The gold mining which attracted people to the area is highlighted by the many photographs of gold mining activities ranging from panning to the dredging for gold. Photos of the local public and Roman Catholic schools reveal diversity of school wear. A photo of people wearing their Sunday best to church reflects times past compared to today where no one wears their Sunday best and even Anglican priests often do not wear clerical garments during church services.

Recreational activities such as lodges, clubs and sporting activities are covered with emphasis on the male of the species.

Folk music is featured in the pages on musicians playing traditional instruments together with a photo of John Meredith playing his button accordion. Mention is made of the Bush Music Club visiting in the 1960s and their playing attracted a big crowd. Although not listed on the title page, BMC life member, Chris Woodland was a prime initiator of this publication having supplied most of the research, photos and text for the publication. His Araluen photographic compilation numbers about 300 images, having collected them over several decades.

Dorothea Mackellar's poem My Country with its words: "Of droughts and flooding rains" is certainly evident in the Araluen district and surrounding areas. Included in the text are a number of poems such as *Snooks* by Alby Matthews, *Dames of the Deua* by JH Sturgiss, *Deua River Woman* by Myrtle Collett (nee Davis) and *The Valley* by Peter P Green.

This title is a testament to the pioneer folk who settled the Araluen district and is a book worth viewing to wonder at the life that once was and how their legacy lives on in the present generation. Another recollection of the Araluen area I have encountered is one about Iree McCarron whose recollection Back of Bendethera' was published in Martin McAdoo's When grandma was just a girl, Sydney, Lansdowne Press, 1983. John Meredith's sisters are featured on the title page of Martin McAdoo's book.

2016 National Folk Festival Report

2016 was a festival of memories and tributes mixed with confidence for the future of folk and Nationals.

Young people were everywhere, performing, singing or busking as were those with greyer hair or other signs of many years attendance at folk festivals. The Bush Music Club should be commended on the special workshops to encourage youthful participation. Moving between the Saplings and the lunchtime sessions kept Helen and Tony Romeo very busy and others too. Chris Woodland, who assisted Dennis and Mem Taberner run the Dennis O'Keeffe lunchtime Australian songs session, said it was one of the best Nationals ever. Among the sizeable gathering of many familiar faces, it was good to see long time BMC members, Ann and Frank Maher with their daughters Helen and Monica enjoying these sessions.

Near the front entrance it was good to see the traditions of Australia's First Peoples presenting aspects of their culture and hear Col Hardy at the National Library. As always the Folklore Conference had some very informative papers. I always learn so much at the Conference and it is always well attended by BMC people. Sandra Nixon had done a very thorough piece of research into the Editors, office bearers and illustrators of the early volumes of 'Singabout'. Chris Woodland presented an insight into his book on Araluen, with some historical photographs.

There were a number of concerts commemorating the humble beginnings from the Melbourne mob in 1967. The program from 2016 had hundreds of performers from every state. Excellent research with recollection of events, programs of the first festival and profiles of people were presented by Phyl Lobl, Danny Spooner and Margaret Roadknight. Colleen Z. Burke organised a commemorative Declan Affley concert. Jeannie Lewis managed to continue her moving rendition of Woody Guthrie's Deportee in spite of the Brass band marching outside the beautiful Speigel Zelt. As one of those from the '67 folk festival, this was not the first time Jeannie had sung unaccompanied and without microphones.

It was wonderful to hear a number of the original performers or younger performers carrying on the traditions.

Jason and Chloe Roweth along with their brilliant band gave a passionate performance including songs and poems with memories of John Dengate. Another themed concert prepared with passion and talent was the moving presentation of The Easter Rising, Ireland 1916. The Fettlers from NT gave an informative concert of songs and stories of the Rails and Planes of the Top End. Peter Mace always has a strong impact with his bush poetry and to represent the young people, Megan Roweth did a very good recital of Paterson's Walgett Town, at the Poet's Breakfast. Sydney Morris dancers and others from every state including some from across the ditch added to the carnival atmosphere, and also ran Morris for Kids.

A special tribute to Peter Ellis brought nostalgic memories of a true gentle man of dance heritage and the people who shared their experience of traditional music and dance. I recall a discussion with Peter, some years ago after we did the Pride of Erin , when he said you Sydney BMC people often seem to have your own versions, and we thought we were the traditionalists! However. doing the Pride of Erin with Roger Holmes from Queensland, I realized they dance another version...,the wonders of folk traditions...

There were plenty of opportunities to join singing sessions, dancing and reciting, but it would be impossible to see everything. I know I missed some great performances.

There were also a number of brilliant overseas visitors who love the authenticity and variety of the National. Pam Merrigan and Organisers did a wonderful job blending them all into the National Program which is so much larger than the one held fifty years ago.






